## Where do I start?

The key decision to make is whether to go down the university or career route, (or programme). So, you need to think about:

## Higher Education (University)

There are more than 45,000 courses available at over 300 institutions in the UK. Not surprisingly, lots of potential university applicants do not know what they want to study or where

A higher education course typically lasts 3 or 4 years, and will involve borrowing a lot of money, so it makes sense to be sure that whatever you do will be worthwhile. Start by asking yourself:

- Why do you want to go to university?
- What subject areas interest you most?
- Is there a specific career you are interested in?
- Do you have any preferences about where you study?
- What are your thoughts about size, location, distance from home or accommodation?
- What financial help may be available?

So now you need to **research** your options. This will take time. Start early and it until Y13 when exam pressure will slowly start to build!

#### Which course? THIS IS THE MOST IMPORTANT BIT...

More than half of graduate jobs are open to graduates with any degree. This means that, unless you have a specific career plan in mind that requires some kind of vocational degree (such as engineering, medicine or veterinary), it makes sense to do a **subject you enjoy**. Of course, this could be an entirely new subject or combination of subjects.

Be aware, courses that share the same title (and code) may vary hugely between different universities. Not only can the entrance requirements differ, but the way the course is delivered and taught, the amount of contact time, the type of study involved and the

## **Which University?**

Universities come in many shapes and sizes, from the elite research-led Russell Group universities with a worldwide reputation to newer universities that have their origins in the old polytechnics. They range in size from 2,000 to 30,000 students, so there are lots of things to consider here:

Academic reputation: the Russell Group universities (such as the University of Leeds) base their reputation on the quality of their research, which means you will

## **Making your UCAS Application**

All university applications are processed by UCAS, but each course you apply for is considered individually by an admissions tutor at each university. The most important points about the UCAS process are:

- You can apply for up to 5 courses (medicine, veterinary medicine and dentistry are limited to 4, plus one other if desired)
- •You register with <a href="www.ucas.com/apply">www.ucas.com/apply</a> and complete your application online (you will success24 for 2024 applications)
- •The UCAS deadline is 31 January 2024, although you are strongly advised to complete your application well before that so you can concentrate on your A level study. The internal school deadline is 24

## **UCAS Tariff**

The UCAS tariff allows universities to make offers that include a wide range of qualifications such as A levels, AS, OCR National and BTECs. It gives points that allow different qualifications to be added together (and to be compared).

The key equivalences for qualifications we offer are these:

### **Personal Statement**

interview prospective students, so the 4000 characters or 47 lines of your personal statement are the only opportunity you have written!

There really is no set model for a personal statement: It helps to think about your universities are looking for to gain a place on your chosen course

#### What admissions tutors want to know:

- why exactly have you applied for that particular course
- is there evidence that you enjoy studying and are specifically interested in the subject
- can you demonstrate the skills requires to study independently and successfully
- are you mature enough to cope with university life
- how you can demonstrate dedication and time-management skills, for example through extra-curricular achievements

You need to get the balance right: at least half the statement should be directly relevant to the course.

It also needs to be engaging and attention-grabbing: you have to stand out from the crowd!
